

Pastor's Message

There is a phenomenon in Christian Churches across the country. People in their 60s, 70s, and 80s no longer desire to serve within the congregation. They have a belief that they have already put in their time on committees, councils, etc. and now it is time for the next generation to step up and serve. There is even a name for this phenomenon: Rocking Chair Theology. Rocking Chair Theology is a belief that when an individual reaches the age of retirement from their vocation, he/she can retire from serving Jesus through the local Body of Christ (congregation).

I'll admit it is an appealing idea; rest and retirement in all aspects of life, but it doesn't fit the biblical understanding of faith. In Psalm 71:17-18 it is written, "O God, from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds. So even to old age and gray hairs, O God, do not forsake me, until I proclaim your might to another generation, your power to all those to come."

The end of a life of service to our God is the grave. There isn't a

prescribed age when we are given permission to stop living lives of discipleship and teaching the faith to others. This is especially critical here at Peace, for we do not yet have the younger generation to step up and serve. There isn't a group

of younger people waiting to step into leadership roles.

How shall we continue to move forward if members no longer want to serve because of old age? I don't have an answer for this question; I'm raising it because we are at a crossroads. How can we continue, let alone grow, our ministries if we adopt the Rocking Chair Theology?

What Does This Mean to Me?

This regular newsletter feature—playing on Luther's famous line in the Small Catechism—is designed to help us all better understand why things happen as they do at Peace. The worship committee actively seeks feedback or questions from congregation members confused or concerned about worship practices.

Where is the proper place for a congregation's Baptismal Font?

There isn't an easy answer to this question. For one, Baptismal Fonts have changed dramatically over the centuries. They were originally about 1 foot deep and 6-8 feet wide. Adults could kneel in the water and have water poured over their heads in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. These massive structures were usually placed to the side of the altar in a building's transept (arm of a cross-shaped building).

Over time, fonts became fancy stands with small bowls, too small to even immerse an infant. Though

sometimes placed at the entrance to the worship space, often these fonts were positioned near the altar in the chancel. The font balanced the pulpit on one side, font on the other side of the altar, like here at Peace. Lately church architecture has begun



returning the font to the entrance of the church. It is through the waters of baptism that we are made members of the Body of Christ, and having the font positioned at the entrance serves as a visible reminder that we are to remember we are baptized and that baptism joins us to the Church.

Pastor Steve moved the Baptismal Font into the Narthex during Advent and Christmas so that it didn't get hidden by the Advent Wreath. Surprisingly there were only positive comments about the move! What are your ideas about Font placement? Pastor Steve would welcome your comments.

Mid-Week Lenten Series: The Gospel in 7 Words or Less

Imagine that a friend or family member who is unfamiliar with your Christian faith asks you to summarize the gospel. She isn't looking for a laundry list of doctrines. She has no interest in hearing you recite the Apostles' Creed. She wants to get to the heart of the matter. "In seven words or less," she says, "tell me what you believe as a Christian."

What would you say? How would you put it? Are you prepared to confess your faith in Jesus?

To be a Christian is to "believe with your heart" and "confess with your mouth" the good news of God's love for us in Christ (Romans 10:9–10). Peter calls us to be prepared always to give a reason for the hope we have as Christians (1 Peter 3:15). Christians have the best news in the world to share! But are we prepared to share it?

During this season of Lent, we're going to prepare to celebrate Holy Week by sharing why Holy Week is



so important. Our midweek worship services will serve as opportunities to consider the many ways in which the Scriptures proclaim Jesus. During the week, each of you will be working on your own summary, with the hopes that all of us are more prepared to share the good news of Jesus. Annual Soup Kitchen Food Drive runs throughout February



Acts 20:35: Jesus our Lord said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

The Soup Kitchen Committee will be holding its annual food/money drive in February. Please consider making donations of cash, gift cards, and/or canned goods. We have planned the menus through 2019 and have specific food item needs.

The Soup Kitchen menus for 2019 include chicken and noodles, ham and hash brown potatoes, old

fashioned goulash, beef stew, sloppy joes, and spaghetti with meat sauce. Each meal also includes one or two vegetables, fruit, bread, and dessert.

Last year PLC members prepared and served 617 meals with donations from PLC, The Flour Shop, the food bank, and the soup kitchen.

Twelve PLC members helped at varying times throughout the year. Peace members serve at the Soup Kitchen on the second Friday of February, April, June, August, October and December, and the Soup Kitchen Committee always welcomes additional help.

We will be posting the complete menu and a giving tree in the narthex beginning in February.

SCRIP program earns more than \$3,000 for Peace in 2018

Peace sold 9,646 cards with a face value of \$79,515 in 2018. These sales generated \$3,221.54 in tax deductible rebates for the church. The tax deductible part is the part each participant generates for themselves as church contributions from their purchases.

We have fewer participants now than we have had in years past. In 2016 our rebates were \$4113.17 for only 7541 cards purchased. Results can vary due to the actual rebate percentages for the particular cards purchased. So all in all we had a great year in 2018.

Watch for a Bulletin Board display on our Scrip program in the near future. We will be offering informational opportunities for you to learn about online purchasing from the comfort of your home as



well as opportunities for those of you who have not discovered the benefits of the program yet.

The top 5 rebates earned this year were \$512.05, \$378.36, \$324.86, \$270.52 and \$235.66. Rebates can be added to the total tax deductible contributions for each Scrip family.... no matter how large or small.
